23rd Annual SWCS Legislative Breakfast Held **February 2, 2006**

Where do you find a group that includes individuals from USDA, NE Dept. Ag/DNR, NRDs, Farming, retired folks and some current University Students? Throw in a few State Senators and a U.S. Senator Aid and you have the formula for the Annual SWCS Legislative Breakfast! This years featured speaker was Ann Bleed, Acting Director of the Nebraska Department of Natural Resources.

Ann lead an open discussion of topics related to LB962 and the current conflicts we are experiencing between surface water and ground water use. One topic of interest is the question of how traditional soil and water conservation practices influence the balance between water supply and use. There is a current void in understanding and hard scientific data to explain where water is going from applying conservation practices.

If water is going to aquifer recharge, excellent. If water is going to consumptive use in growing the crop, then the question becomes "how will that consumptive use be mitigated?

Points of discussion from the group in attendance included:

- No one is advocating eliminating conservation practices.
- Best cropland under conservation still provides more runoff than native rangeland.
- The issue is we are currently over used in certain basins, so what do we do?
- FACTS are needed concerning conservation practices impacts and no one is afraid of facts.
- Once we have the facts we can look at trade offs and find areas where we can all agree to move forward.

After reading the above information from the Annual Legislative Breakfast the question is: What can NE SWCS do to help facilitate the current issues being raised about traditional soil and water conservation practices? 

Honor Award – Mary Cave, Chappell NE. Mary owns and operates Cave Ranch Company with a long running pledge to conservation on the land. A good picture of Mary's operation would be to envision a neat farm yard encircled by rangeland, the nature of which is both riparian and rolling upland. Mary and her late husband Harold have been practicing conservation since beginning farming in 1944. Their approach has included both traditional (terraces, grass planting and no-till) and nontraditional (biological weed control with insects - goats & llamas plus riparian zone management) conservation practices.

Merit Award – Shell Creek

Watershed Improvement Group (Gene Wisenberg pictured with Rob). The Shell Creek Watershed improvement Group (SCWIG) was formed in 1999. The group is made up of landowners, agricultural producers, community residents and businesses. The group was formed to address poor water quality in the Shell Creek area. The SCWIG feels it is essential for landowners to start managing their natural resources to improve the quality of Shell Creek and have developed a Management Plan with numerous conservation based objectives.





Merit Award – Peter Berthelsen, Director of Conservation Programs, NE Pheasants Forever. NE Pheasants Forever was created in 1986 and has grown to 59 Chapters with over 11,000 members who are working together to make a difference for wildlife. The simple objective of Pheasants Forever is to raise funds for local habitat projects, conservation education and other worthy conservation causes. Pheasants Forever is the most cost effective wildlife conservation group in the country with 93 percent of every dollar raised going to program services.

50 + Years of Conservation Award – Dwight Dell, Beatrice Nebraska. Dwight served on the Mud Creek watershed

board since its beginning. The Work Plan for the watershed was approved in 1958 while Dwight was the chairman of the board. Dwight was involved extensively in the work to amend the Work Plan in 1969 to include what is now Rockford Lake. Dwight served on the Lower Big Blue NRD Board from its beginning in 1972 until January 1987. Dwight is active in a family farming and Dairy operation.
